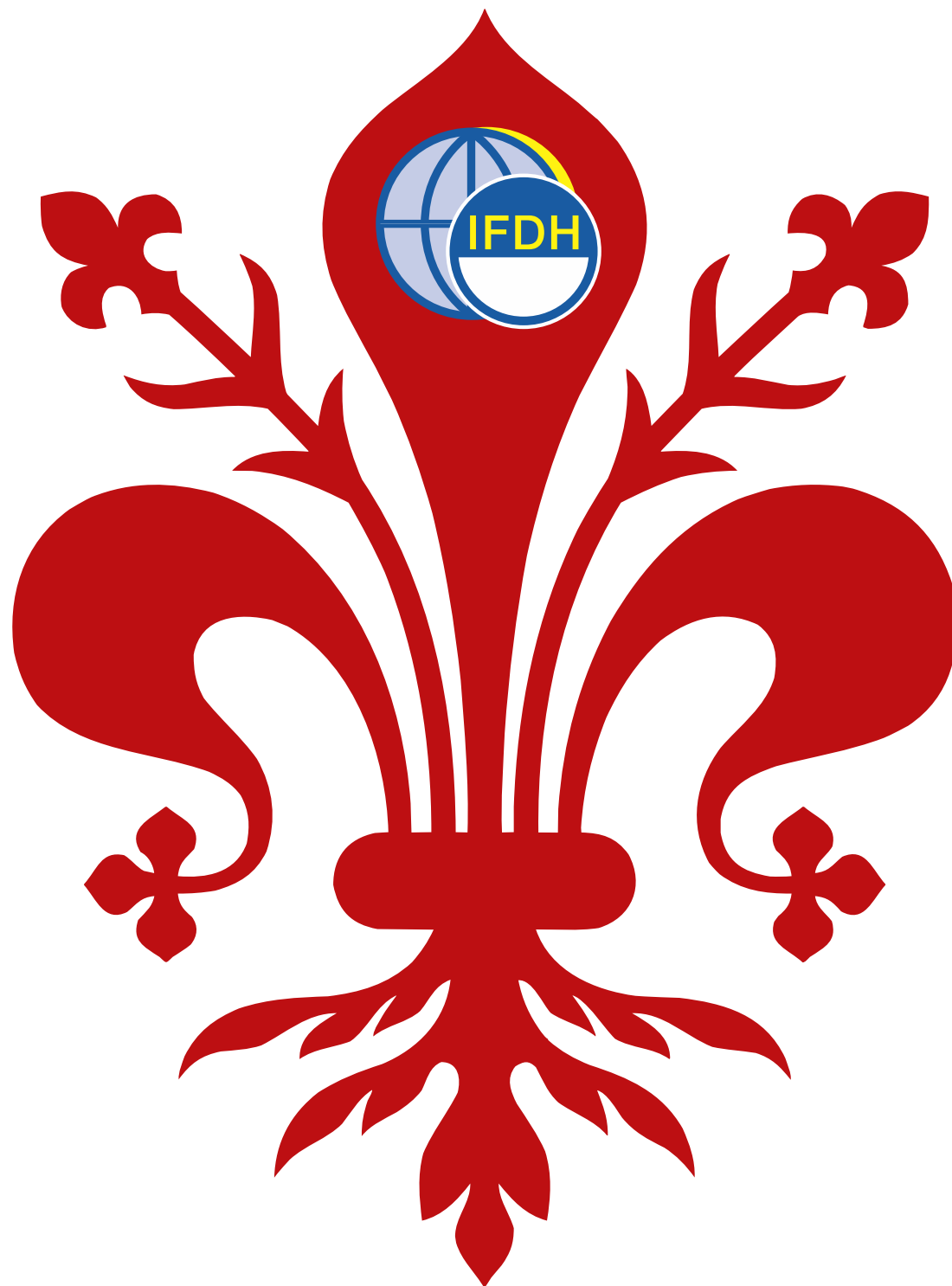

Professor Raman Bedi

Chairman, Global Child Dental Fund and
WFPHA Oral Health Committee

Raman Bedi was Chief Dental Officer – England from October 2002 to October 2005. Notable developments during this period were him leading the team which led to establishment, in law, the Health and Social Care Act (dental clauses) 2004, Water Act (Fluoridation) 2004 and the Section 60 (2005) order reforming the General Dental Council.

Other focuses included reform of the prison dental service and of the Salaried Dental Service. In September 2005 he chaired the UK European Union Presidency dental programme.

From 1998–2008 he was the co-director of the World Health Organization Collaborating Centre at the Eastman Dental Institute. Currently he is Professor of Transcultural Oral Health at King's College London. He holds several international honorary chairs, including an honorary "Extraordinary Professorship" in Paediatric Dentistry at the University of the Western Cape, South Africa (2007–2010)

His research focuses on early childhood caries. He has published over 200 scientific papers and his Researchgate score is presently 39.66 with approximately 4000 citations. He serves on several editorial boards.

Since 2012 Raman has been the founding chair of the World Federation of Public Health Associations oral health working group, raising the importance of oral health issues affecting global public health. He was unanimously re-elected to a second term in 2015.

Raman is a WHO consultant in curriculum development in the area of patient safety and dentistry and was the co-chair of the Global Expert Committee on dental caries management and prevention. He recently was asked by the WHO to review dental services in Oman.

He was President of the British Society for Disability and Oral Health (2002), President of the Education Research Group of the International Association for Dental Research (IADR) (2002–2004) and chair of the IADR Regional Development Programme Committee (2002–2004).

Leadership: Your Role As A Change Agent: Promoting Your Program

Abstract:

The focus of dental education has largely been on patient management and acquiring clinical skills. Leadership and social responsibility are often viewed for the few and an optional extra for the rest of the profession.

The aim of this lecture is to present a case where leadership skills are shown to be an essential component of a dental professionals core competency and social responsibility part of every dental professionals day to day clinical activities. The online Advanced Dental Leadership programme will be introduced.



Professor Kenneth Eaton

Chair, Platform for Better Oral Health in Europe

Ken Eaton studied at London University for his BDS, MSc (with distinction) and PhD. He has worked in all areas of dentistry and is listed by the General Dental Council as a specialist in Periodontics and in Dental Public Health. Between 1984 and 1989 he was the Director of the Royal Air Force's School of Dental Hygiene and a national examiner of Dental Hygienists. He has held visiting chairs at a number of UK and European universities and is currently a Visiting Professor at the University of Leeds and an Honorary Professor at the University of Kent.

His past Presidencies include those of the IADR Education Research and Practice-based Research Groups and the European Association of Dental Public Health. He was the first Chair of the Platform for Better Oral Health in Europe.

Ken is the Adviser to the Council of European Chief Dental Officers and has advised the World Health Organisation and the Health Departments of several European countries, including the House of Commons Select Committee on Health.

He is the Chair of the British Dental Editors Forum and has edited a number of dental journals. He has published over 330 scientific works, most recently the book *Practical Periodontics*.

What's The Cost? The Economic Burden Of Dental Caries And Other Oral Diseases

Abstract:

In 2010, the Global Burden of Disease study reported that untreated dental caries in permanent teeth was the most prevalent of 291 diseases which were assessed. It also found that oral conditions affected 3.9 million people. Accurate calculation of the costs of dental caries, periodontal diseases and oral cancer, both in financial and short- or long-term disability other than death is extremely difficult. However estimates have been made. Against this background, this presentation will consider current epidemiologic trends in oral disease, estimates of the cost of these diseases and how a national programme of prevention has reduced the cost of oral disease in 5-year-olds in Scotland.



Yvonne Nyblom RDH

President European Dental Hygienists Federation, EDHF
and the Swedish Dental Hygienist Association, STHF.

Yvonne Nyblom is an RDH since 1981 and has worked as a dental hygienist in both public and private settings, including as an independent practitioner. Yvonne has been engaged in the professional development of the dental hygienist profession on both national and international levels through a wide range of assignments for the Swedish Dental Hygienist Association, as well as for the International Federation of Dental Hygienists and the European Dental Hygienist Federation.

Oral Health – Two Projects – One Goal!

Abstract:

One of the objectives for the European Dental Hygienist Federation, EDHF, is to contribute to a better oral health in society. Through two different Erasmus+ project EDHF have collaborated with European partners in order to do so.

The Com4You project is a “Youth Community-based oral health learning model”, for enhancing the oral health literacy of the younger population and to prove how the implementation of the model can improve oral health of youth in Rumania.

The model addresses dental health care and mobilisation of community resources for the improvement of youth dental health.

The EuHyDens project; “European Training Platform for Continuing Professional Development of Dental Hygienists” is not yet finished.

Dental hygienists are at the centre of any strategy to increase access to oral health care. Dental hygienists have to be able to provide preventive services outside of dentists' offices or creating advanced-provider models that involve training hygienists to perform with an expanded scope of practice and less supervision. Some of the barriers to access for underserved populations will be the same, regardless of whether services are provided by a dentist or a dental hygienist. Well-educated dental hygienists are a key factor in reaching better oral health for all!



Dr. Onno Hofman

Chairman, Ivory Cross, Netherlands

Dr Onno Hofman is Chairman of the Dutch section of the Pierre Fauchard Academy and member of the Dutch Counsel for complaints in dental matters. He works a day in a the week as a dentist in care houses with very frail elderly people in the Netherlands

As a dentist general practitioner since 1982, Dr Hofman recognises that there has always been need for attention for mouth care of the youth and (frail) elderly. Since 2015 Dr Hofman is proud to be Chairman of het IvorenKruis (The Ivory Cross), a Dutch organisation for dental prevention with a history of 110 years. The aim of the IVK, assisted by the Scientific Counsel (Advies college) consists of two Professors and 4 University lecturers, is to give advise at guidelines level for the dental profession in prevention. Procedures such as sealants, fluoride application, erosion treatment; production of brochures for patients and organising projects to support oral disease prevention .

Ivory Cross Social Responsibility Programs In The Netherlands

Abstract:

Social responsibility programmes, where professional volunteers working in oral care (dentists, oral hygienists, preventive assistants) are giving time and enlightenment for oral disease prevention to the youth and nurse/care givers in care houses for the frail elderly, is one of the primary aims of our projects. These projects will be discussed.



Professor Wendell Evans

Honorary Colgate Associate Professor, WHO Consultant
Faculty of Dentistry, University of Sydney, AUSTRALIA

Professor Evans has been the consultant to WHO on Early childhood caries for the last two years. He has been a Professor at the University of Sydney for many years and as held role several roles with IADR including as the President of the Australia New Zealand chapter.

He has expertise in community water fluoridation, dental fluorosis, the prevention and management of dental caries (tooth decay), and oral health promotion.

He led the development of the Caries Management System (CMS) protocols for adults and children/adolescents. These protocols deal with the primary prevention of caries and with non-invasive treatment to arrest early caries lesions and prevent them from progressing to cavities.

The CMS was tested successfully in a group of very high risk patients. Then, as principal investigator of the Monitor Dental Practice Program, a randomly controlled clinical trial of the CMS in general dental practices was implemented and funded by a National Health & Medical Research Council of Australia project grant. This research project is concerned with the cost-effectiveness of preventive care in general practice and on the attitudes of patients and dentists towards the preventive management of dental caries.

This 7-year randomised controlled clinical trial had two important outcomes: first, that patients attending the intervention practices (CMS) needed 50% fewer restorative interventions compared with patients attending the control practices; and second, that preventive treatment for caries, according to the Caries Management System, is cost effective.

Professor Evans work with WHO concerns the development of a manual, principally for use in developing countries, on the management of ECC. Heam leading the development of the chapter on Caries Diagnosis and Risk Assessment.

Diagnosis, Epidemiology, And Risk Of Early Childhood Caries – A World Health Organisation Challenge

Abstract:

The increased prevalence of Early Childhood Caries (ECC) is a World Health Organisation (WHO) challenge. In 2016, a Global Consultation on ECC was held in Thailand to address this problem and to prepare for the publication of a WHO manual on how to manage ECC. It was acknowledged that the understanding of ECC is limited and that ECC epidemiology is lacking. In this respect, it was recognised that the WHO criterion for a carious tooth is a dentine cavity – a late stage lesion – and that earlier stages of caries lesions may be identified and treated to prevent their progression to cavities. The WHO manual will include chapters covering all facets of ECC and, in particular, will be relevant to situations in developing countries.

The purpose of this presentation is to describe a proposal for diagnostic criteria for ECC to be used in both the clinical care and epidemiologic situations. Since the management of ECC is risk-specific, both in relation to preventive and treatment interventions, a proposal for a pragmatic ECC risk assessment protocol is included.



Dr. David Walker BDS, PhD

Honorary Research Fellow, WFPHA Oral Health Committee

Dr David Walker is a Honorary Research Fellow in Oral Health at the University of Sydney. He holds a Bachelor's degree in Dentistry, a Master's degree in Health Personnel Education and a Doctorate in Public Health.

Dr Walker's doctoral research on the development of the oral health role of Indigenous Health Workers in remote communities was awarded the Public Health Association of Australia award 'for outstanding contribution to public health research in Aboriginal populations'.

Dr Walker has been successful in the award of over \$2.5 million in project funding and has wide experience in managing projects across Australia and in developing countries. Dr Walker's principle interests are in the development of innovative approaches to improved community oral health and the development of new roles for primary health personnel.

Project Design (Considering Ethics And Format)

Abstract:

Dr Walker will be speaking on project design and the preparation of project plans and project funding proposals. He will also be speaking on project management including working with communities, the project team, funders, partners and other stakeholders; and project implementation focusing on project monitoring and risk management.
